Resources For Survivors of Crime and Abuse

## **The Problem**

**American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/AN)** have the **highest crime victimization rates** in the nation but often have difficulty connecting with the services that exist to help them recover from crime and abuse.

## **The Response**

The Office for Victims of Crime of the U.S. Department of Justice has funded the National Center for Victims of Crime, National Congress of American Indians, and Tribal Law and Policy Institute to create a **web-based resource tool** that will:

- ▶ Provide a **listing of all services** available for AI/AN survivors of crime and abuse and
- ▶ Help **identify gaps in services** so those can be addressed.

The tool will launch in early 2018, and will include services for:

- ▶ all **needs** of victims, including justice, safety, healing, and support
